

## TERMS OF REFERENCE FOR A NON-ENDOWED FUND

### NAME OF NON-ENDOWED FUND

# TELFER MHA DIVERSITY AND EQUITY ADMISSION SCHOLARSHIP FOR WOMEN

### INTRODUCTION

This scholarship was created by Dean of the Telfer School of Management.

### PURPOSE OF FUND

To support female graduate students admitted to the MHA program at the Telfer School of Management at the University of Ottawa who are members of a racialized or Indigenous community and involved in their community.

### SCHOLARSHIP DETAILS

#### Eligibility Criteria

Recipients must:

1. be a Canadian citizen or a permanent resident;
2. be admitted as a full-time female graduate student in the MHA program at the Telfer School of Management of the University of Ottawa;
3. demonstrate involvement in their community; and
4. be a racialized person (member of a visible minority) and defined as a person other than Indigenous (Aboriginal), who is non-white in colour or race, regardless of place of birth or citizenship;

OR

provide documented proof of Indigenous identity, in accordance with the requirements of the University of Ottawa Eligibility for Focused Admissions, Scholarships, and Bursaries for First Nations, Inuit, and Métis People administrative procedure

**Value of the award:** \$15,000  
**Number of awards:** 1  
**Frequency of the award:** Annual  
**Level or program of study:** Graduate  
**Application deadline:** July 15

### APPLICATION PROCEDURE

Applications must be made through Online Scholarships and Bursaries, which can be accessed through [uozone.uOttawa.ca](https://uozone.uOttawa.ca) and must include:

1. proof of Indigenous identity, in accordance with the requirements of the University of Ottawa Eligibility for Focused Admissions, Scholarships, and Bursaries for First Nations, Inuit, and Métis People administrative procedure;  
OR  
self-identification from the applicant who identifies as a member of a racialized community as per the [Ontario Human Rights Commission policy and guidelines on racism and racial discrimination](#) section 2.1 ("Race" — A social construct"); and
2. a letter (max. 500 words) describing the applicant's involvement in her community.
