TELFER DIVERSITY AND EQUITY SCHOLARSHIP

INTRODUCTION

This scholarship was created by the dean of the Telfer School of Management.

PURPOSE OF FUND

To support undergraduate students who are members of a racialized or Indigenous community, involved in their community and enrolled at the Telfer School of Management of the University of Ottawa.

SCHOLARSHIP DETAILS

Eligibility criteria

Applicants must meet the following criteria:

- 1. be a Canadian citizen or a permanent resident
- 2. be enrolled as a full-time second-year student at the Telfer School of Management of the University of Ottawa
- be a racialized person (member of a visible minority) and defined as a person other than Indigenous (Aboriginal), who is non-white in colour or race, regardless of place of birth or citizenship

OR

provide documented proof of Indigenous identity, in accordance with the requirements of the University of Ottawa Eligibility for Focused Admissions, Scholarships, and Bursaries for First Nations, Inuit, and Métis People administrative procedure

- 4. be involved in their community
- 5. have a CGPA of 4 or higher

Value of the award: \$15,000 (\$5,000 per year — renewable for three years)

Number of awards: 3
Frequency of the award: Annual

Level or program of study: Undergraduate

Application deadline: October 31

Renewable: Yes (see conditions below)

This scholarship can be renewed automatically so long as the student meets the renewal criteria. Scholarships are awarded for three years, as long as the recipient maintains a cumulative grade point average (CGPA) of 4.0 or higher at the end of each academic year and remains a full-time student at the Telfer School of Management. Temporary interruption of studies or enrolment as a part-time or non-degree student will lead to revocation of the scholarship.

APPLICATION PROCEDURE

Applications must be made through Online Scholarships and Bursaries, which can be accessed through the uoZone portal. Applicants must provide:

- 1. a letter (500 words max.) describing their involvement in the community
- documented proof of Indigenous identity, in accordance with the requirements of the University of Ottawa Eligibility for Focused Admissions, Scholarships, and Bursaries for First Nations, Inuit, and Métis People administrative procedure. OR

self-identification as a member of a racialized community in accordance with the <u>Ontario</u> <u>Human Rights Commission policy and guidelines on racism and racial discrimination section</u> <u>2.1</u> ("Race" — A social construct")
