Matthew Hanson Undergraduate History Scholarship

INTRODUCTION

Patricia Malloy, mother of Matthew Hanson (1979–2006), received an MA in history from the University of Ottawa in 1971. Prior to that, she received an honours BA in modern history in 1965 from the University of Toronto. She was the first female faculty member at Collège Sainte-Anne, in Church Point, Nova Scotia, where she taught from 1969 to 1971. From 1972 to 2005, she taught in the continuing education department of the Toronto District School Board and its predecessors. Married to Kenneth Hanson, she is the mother of three sons, Mark, Daniel and Matthew, who were born and grew up in Toronto. Matthew worked in planning and received an honours bachelor of arts (2002) and a master of science in planning (2004), both from the University of Toronto.

PURPOSE OF FUND

To assist second- or third-year undergraduate students in a program at the University of Ottawa Department of History, Faculty of Arts.

SCHOLARSHIP DETAILS

Eligibility criteria

Applicants must meet the following criteria:

- Be a Canadian citizen, a permanent resident, a person with protected or refugee status, or an international student.
- Be enrolled as a full- or part-time second- or third-year undergraduate student in the Department of History, Faculty of Arts of the University of Ottawa.
- Demonstrate financial need, as determined by the Financial Aid and Awards Service of the University of Ottawa.
- Be in good academic standing.
